


A Man Named Martin - Part One - The Man

Dear Friends in Christ,

It has been the tradition of the church during Lent to offer mid-week worship services that follow a theological theme. This year we will be taking a look at the Ten Com-

mandments. Though many in our culture may think the Ten Commandments are old fashioned and no longer relevant to modern society, I would say the commandments are still God's gift to us to help keep order in a chaotic world (fence), reveal our need for Jesus (mirror), and to provide a way to live our lives that will help us live in a positive relationship with God and with our neighbors (guide).

The Ten Commandments were given to the people of Israel following God's miraculous rescue from Egyptian slavery through a series of plagues. Out in the wilderness, the Lord descended on Mount Sinai and called Moses to climb up to the top to meet with Him. On the mountain God first spoke these words: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery." (Exodus 20:1, 2) By His grace, His unmerited love, God reminded the people that He rescued them from slavery so that they could now be His chosen people. The Ten Commandments followed this proclamation which explained how the people were to live as God's children. The way they lived was to be a witness to the world around them that they were children of the Lord God Almighty.

God's gracious rescue of Israel is a picture of God's gracious rescue of the whole world from the slavery of sin through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. God's law, which demands perfection, convicts us of our sin as a mirror which reflects our sinfulness. For it was never the intent of the law to save us. "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus." (Ephesians 2:4-7)

As children of grace we now see the Ten Commandments as God's gift to us. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." (Ephesians 2:8-10) Knowing who we are as children of grace, we now see the Ten Commandments as God's way to live, not to save us, but to reflect who we are as children of God.

It is my prayer, as we work through the Ten Commandments this Lenten season, that we will all better understand why God's way of living is the best way to live our lives.

If you don't have this recipe for Chocolate Wacky Cake in your easy and delicious cake file, you will want to include it after you give it a try. This is a favorite for birthday cakes, picnics and potlucks.

CHOCOLATE WACKY CAKE

Sift into a mixing bowl and set aside:

Flour

3 cups all purpose flour (14.3 oz.)

Or

3 ¼ cup cake flour (14.7 oz.)

2 cups sugar

1 teaspoon salt

6 tablespoons cocoa

2 teaspoons baking soda

Combine:

2 cups liquid – cold water or cold coffee

2 tablespoon vinegar

¾ cup oil

2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix liquid ingredients into dry ingredients until batter is smooth.

Pour into 9X13 inch pan & bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees or until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean.

Or

Can make 24 cupcakes. Bake for 25 minutes in a 350 degree oven until center springs back when tested.

Frost with your favorite frosting or dust with powdered sugar.





Moving Forward on the Purchase of New Signs



It has been a long process, but I hope we can now move forward with our sign purchase. Thanks to Jim Fougnie's help, we have been working with another sign company to receive a second estimate. New signage is expensive, but I be-

lieve it is time to present to our community a more contemporary image of our ministry. The monument sign will help brighten the corner and serve to advertise our ministry and the three worship services. The digital sign will allow us to present a variety of messages that can be changed wirelessly through a computer. You may have noticed a number of churches in our area using digital sign technology.



The Four Monument Signs will cost \$10,840.00 and the Digital Sign will cost \$21,192.00. Over \$18,000 has been given for the sign project. Thanks to all who have given towards this project. I'm sorry it has taken so long. At the congregational meeting in August it was approved to go ahead and buy the new signs using reserve funds. It would be great if we could all help fund this project. A copy of the contract can be seen in the church office if you would like to take a closer look. Stewardship Corner

But how much are we to give to this local congregation? His instructions are these: to give regularly (1 Cor 6:1–2), proportionally (1 Cor 16:1–2; 2 Cor 8:12), and generously (2 Cor 8:20) of our first fruits (Gen 4:4; Prov 3:9; Lev 27:30) with a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor 9:7), and love (2 Cor 8:23).

Thus, giving to the church is not to be an afterthought, given after everything else is spent. In this way, it is deliberate. We give it regularly, whenever we have income. We set it aside beforehand, before anything else is spent. From those first fruits, we set aside a proportionate and generous amount. Ten percent was the standard for the Israelites. Tithing was a command for them. St. Paul never mentions a tithe. Since a tithe was the bare minimum for the people of Israel in the Old Testament, perhaps St. Paul had more in mind. That aside, however, ten percent is an easy way to figure out an amount. You simply move your weekly, bimonthly, monthly, or yearly income one decimal point to the left. And that's it. That's what you put in the offering plate to support your local congregation so that you may continue to be a hearer of God's word by sharing all good things with those who teach it to you.

And how are we to give it? We give it with eagerness and earnestness. We give it cheerfully and with love, not out of compulsion. For through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, God has made us His children, forgiven us all our sins, given us grace upon grace, promised us life everlasting with Him in His kingdom, and filled us with His own Spirit, the Holy Spirit. This makes giving a joy. For it is more blessed to give than to receive (Acts 20:35).

Worship Themes for March



First Sunday in Lent—March 5, 2017—"Christ the Conqueror"

Jesus does it all for us! The Sundays in Lent, the most reflective and penitential season of the Church Year, still reflect the glory and the truth of the resurrection promise of Easter. Jesus has overcome sin, death, and the devil. He successfully dealt with the temptations of Satan—a major accomplishment that signals greater things yet to come. We joyfully celebrate our Lord's victory.

Old Testament Reading—*Genesis 3:1–21*—(The disastrous fall of mankind into sin) Epistle—*Romans 5:12–19*—(The life-giving work of Christ is for our justification.) Holy Gospel—*Matthew 4:1–11*—(Jesus is led into the wilderness by the Spirit.)

Second Sunday in Lent—March 12, 2017—"The Gift of the Redeemer"

Today we hear the wonderfully familiar "Gospel in a nutshell" from John 3. The first words of the passage say it well: "God so loved." God is loving even when we are less than lovable. In the season of Lent, we see God's love at work in the cross of Jesus. Here in worship, we receive God's wonderful gifts that demonstrate His amazing love.

Old Testament Reading—*Genesis 12:1–9*—(The promise of God is made to Abram.) Epistle—*Romans 4:1–8, 13–17*—(The faith of Abraham, who believed God) Holy Gospel—*John 3:1–17*—(Jesus teaches Nicodemus by night on being born again.)

Third Sunday in Lent—March 19, 2017—"Satisfaction Guaranteed"

"O refresh us, Trav'ling through this wilderness" (LSB 924:3). The well-known hymn stanza reminds us that we live amid challenges and dangers each day. As we gather for worship, we come to a place where our gracious God does refresh us. We are sustained by Word and Sacrament. We are encouraged by the fellowship of the faithful. Our cups run over with living water. We are renewed and satisfied and made ready to journey further in the name of the Lord.

Old Testament Reading—*Exodus 17:1*–7—(God provides water from a rock at Rephidim.) Epistle—*Romans 5:1*–8—(Christ died for us while we were still sinners.) Holy Gospel—*John 4:5*–26 (27–30, 39–42) - (Jesus meets with the Samaritan woman at the well.)

Fourth Sunday in Lent—March 26, 2017—"Karma? I'll Take Grace"

God has a plan for each of us. He has an amazing and surprising plan individually crafted. It may not follow the pattern that we or those around feel it should be. But it is God's plan, shaped by His grace. We joyfully put our trust in the graciousness of the God who created, redeemed, and sanctifies us.

Old Testament Reading—Isaiah 42:14–21—(The Lord will turn darkness into light.) Epistle—Ephesians 5:8–14—(Walking as children of the light) Holy Gospel—John 9:1–41—Jesus heals a man who was born blind.)

Lenten Service Themes



Ash Wednesday—March 1, 2017—"Return to the Lord"

"Return to the LORD, your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in stead-fast love" (Joel 2:13). With these words, our dear Father tenderly calls all humans, who by nature have turned away from the face-to-face relationship of love for which He has created us. Don't be afraid! He tenderly invites us to return to His fatherly embrace. Jesus on the cross—the shape placed with ashes on your forehead—this Jesus is proof that God is good, and that He loves all people, eager-

ly awaiting our return to face-to-face communion with Him.

Old Testament Reading—Joel 2:12–19—(Return to the Lord your God!)
Epistle—2 Corinthians 5:20b–6:10—(Be reconciled to God.)
Holy Gospel—Matthew 6:1–6—(Your Father who sees in secret will reward you.)

Lenten Service Themes continued...

Second Mid-Week Lenten Service—March 8, 2017—"Catechetical Series: The Ten Commandments— Commandment Eight

When Jesus came into the world, He not only took all of our sin upon Himself, but He also experienced what it's like to be sinned against. Bearing in His body the brokenness of the world, our Lord was broken by the deceitfulness and the lies of wicked men. As we focus on the Ten Commandments during our midweek worship services, let us ponder the depth of Christ's sacrifice for us as He placed Himself under the curse of the Law. Despised and rejected by the leaders of His own people, Jesus willingly went to the cross so that we may be accepted into His Father's family. Let us rejoice in His saving work!

Old Testament Reading—*Psalm 15:1*–5—The blameless speak truth.) Holy Gospel—*Matthew 26:57–68*—(Jesus appears before Caiaphas and the council.)

Third Mid-Week Lenten Service—March 15, 2017—Catechetical Series: The Ten Commandments—Commandment Seven

Subjected to the thievery of mankind, Jesus was robbed of His life when He was nailed to the cross. Yet in the greatest reversal our world has ever known, Christ took back His life on the third day and now gives it to all who trust in Him! As we stand before Him in worship, we repent of the many ways in which we steal from others, ways that show we do not always fear, love, and trust in God above all things. By His Word and Spirit, our Savior will once again renew us in His forgiveness and restore us in His righteousness. May He open our eyes to see the many opportunities we have to love and help others as we review the Seventh Commandment!

Epistle—1 John 3:16–18—(Let us love in deed and in truth.) Holy Gospel—John 12:1–8—(Jesus is anointed by Mary at Bethany.)

Fourth Mid-Week Lenten Service—March 22, 2017—Catechetical Series: The Ten Commandments— Commandment Six

The Bible says King David was a man after God's own heart, and yet he fell into the temptations of lust and the sin of adultery. God gave us His Sixth Commandment to protect us and to bless us. When the Sixth Commandment, or any commandment, is broken, lives can be ruined, as we learn from David's story. In worship, we will see how Christ alone is the source of healing and forgiveness for all who break God's commands. Only in Christ Jesus do we learn to see our own body as a temple of the Holy Spirit and sex as a good gift to be enjoyed between a man and a woman in holy marriage. As we worship the One who remains faithful to us, may we honor Him with lives of purity.

Old Testament Reading—2 Samuel 11:1–5—(King David commits adultery.) Epistle—1 Corinthians 6:12–20—(The body is a temple of the Holy Spirit.)

Fifth Mid-Week Lenten Service—March 29,2017—Catechetical Series: The Ten Commandments—Commandment Five

In his attempt to cover up his sin of adultery, King David committed ruthless murder. Such a heinous crime is certainly deserving of God's wrath, but so are the angry thoughts of our minds, which Jesus says make us liable to judgment. As we compare our lives to the Fifth Commandment, we see that we are all guilty. Only in Christ can this guilt be removed. He who forbids us to murder was Himself murdered for us by His Good Friday death on the cross. Bearing in His body all the sins of the world, Jesus suffered God's wrath in David's place, in my place, in your place, so that we can now live in His forgiveness—and learn to value the life He gives!

Old Testament Reading—2 Samuel 11:1–27—(David covers up his adultery with ruthless murder.) Epistle—1 John 3:11–16—(We ought to lay down our lives for the brothers.)




